The Portland Mystery Drama Group and the Council of the Portland Branch have gratefully received the offer of an anonymous, \$1,000 matching grant to support production of the Mystery Dramas in Portland. We are taking up the challenge to raise the matching \$1,000 over the next 6 months with enthusiasm and a great sense of responsibility. The Drama Group is in its 6th year of working together, and funding will support them with costumes, scenery, props, and some breathing room to be more creative as they intend to offer 1 or 2 scenes this year, the 100th anniversary of the first production of the first Mystery drama by Rudolf Steiner.

In an effort to clarify what it is that we accomplish by taking up the Mystery Dramas, both for the community and for the individual, I sat down for a conversation with Diane Rumage, the director of the group, and Summer Arnett, one of the actors. The conversation ran wide and deep, and I have attempted below to distill some of the essence of it. Look for future installments.

To begin, Diane noted that according to Rudolf Steiner, all of Anthroposophy is contained in the Mystery Dramas. She observed that when the ideas contained in Anthroposophy are presented artistically, the activity embodies knowledge into your body, into your sleep life, which then echoes in ways that just reading information can't. The artistic presentation is more vivid, and easier to remember than the written word. This is even truer for the actors, who get increasingly deeper insights as they continue working with the material over time.


Summer remembered that in a recent lecture Stephen Usher talked about opening a doorway to the truth, and that mechanical sound doesn't open it the way that live performance does. She noted that the purpose of most live

SPECIAL DOCUMENTARY FILM SCREENING ON THE HONEYBEE COLLAPSE

Queen of the Sun, a feature documentary film by Taggart Siegel (The Real Dirt on Farmer John), will be showing on Saturday evening, March 20th, the final night of Gunther Hauk's honeybee workshop "Colony Collapse Disorder: A Blessing in Disguise". A wine and cheese reception will begin at 7 PM. The film begins at 8:00 and will be followed by a Q & A with Director Taggart Siegel and Producer Jon Betz.



SYNOPSIS: Queen of the Sun is an in-depth investigation to discover the causes and solutions behind Colony Collapse Disorder; a phenomenon where honeybees, who pollinate nearly half of the food we eat, vanish from their hives, never to return. Inspired from Rudolf Steiner's lectures on bees, Queen of the Sun follows the voices and visions of underrepresented beekeepers, philosophers, and scientists around the world, all struggling for the survival of the honeybees. While other films made on honeybees focus exclusively on commercial beekeepers, Queen of the Sun emphasizes biodynamic beekeepers who have

performance is simply to entertain or produce feelings, and that there seems to be a fear of presenting anything spiritual other than vague references because it is likely that the audience will react negatively because of stereotypes about Christianity.

An important purpose of theater is to bring inspiration to the audience. The Mystery Dramas offer a living experience of what it is to be human, they keep us connected with our spiritual roots, and can show movement of soul and spirit through time. We see how everybody's soul path is different. We are offered very specific experiences of soul crises, and of spiritual beings. The Dramas portray a Christian representation of reincarnation and karma in an accurate and vivid way. They show how it works in a group, that your destiny doesn't just affect you. We are inspired to work together for the good of the earth, shown how we can manifest the

differing opinions from many commercial beekeepers and are often overlooked.

Taggart Siegel, Director of *Queen of the Sun*, first met Gunther Hauk in 2007, on Gunther's last day of teaching at the Pfeiffer Center after 17 years working as a dedicated teacher and beekeeper. Taggart had recently read an article about Colony Collapse Disorder, a phenomenon where bees mysteriously disappear from their hives. The article featured a quote that was reportedly said by Einstein, "If bees disappear, then man would only have four years of life left on Earth." The gravity of the quote made Taggart concerned for the world and what his three year-old daughter might inherit.

Taggart was screening The Real Dirt on Farmer John at the Pfeiffer Center and, knowing his next film would be about bees, he was very interested in meeting Gunther Hauk, who had been working with bees in sustainable, respectful ways. Their conversation revealed that Gunther was deeply moved by Taggart's film. In The Real Dirt on Farmer John, John gives up farming completely, but years later has a revelation to revitalize his farm through the biodynamic methods that he learned from the teachings of Rudolf Steiner. Watching the film, Gunther and his wife Vivian were deeply touched and inspired by John's tenacity, and realized what deep abysses had to be bridged to succeed in such a venture. That night, Gunther went to bed with big questions whether his wish to create a honeybee sanctuary on a biodynamic farm as a haven for this maltreated and exploited animal could ever be realized. The next morning, the bees gave him courage to move forward! With lots of enthusiasm, hard work and help, Gunther and his wife were able to incorporate Spikenard Farm a month after this experience. He retired, as planned, from the Pfeiffer Center a year later and with the help of a generous donor they moved to Illinois to begin the work. It was one of the first honeybee sanctuaries in the world.



Inspired by Steiner's seven lectures on bees, *Queen of the Sun* examines the problem of Colony Collapse Disorder (CCD) by following the lives of Gunther Hauk and other

mysteries in the earth, even to the formation of a business venture, through understanding each others' karma and spiritual science. The Christian way is to keep coming to earth until everybody has evolved and the earth is transformed. You don't leave anyone behind just because you're far ahead. In the Dramas we can see the consequences of our thoughts and feelings and actions from one life to another, the reverberations on the other side of the Threshold, how knots of karma are formed and dissolved, the repercussions in the next life, or how we have helped someone else. This is what humanity is searching for, how to work together in community spiritually.

The Mystery Dramas mirror our attempts at morality and the evil in ourselves. Human decisions, human encounters bring up issues of morality that you have to encounter.

People are trying to become aware of environmental issues, but a lot of people could care less. Today, unlike throughout history there's no outer power holding our morality, not church, nor society, nor family. Medieval morality plays had stock good and bad characters, but we don't relate to them the same way today, because we're struggling with ourselves in each moment. In the Dramas we see characters wrestling with questions, but they don't necessarily have answers.

The Drama Group works intensively with speech formation because it is essential that the language be alive and dynamic, and not merely "natural". Theater originated in the mysteries, with the Gods directing the action. The Mysteries, especially the Sun Mysteries, had to do with preparing for the Christ. Now people need to find their way to the Gods, to connect humans with the spirit in each other and the world. So the gestures and speech used should have the creative capacity that the words carry. The speech formation is important for portraying accurately the qualities of a particular spiritual being. If you see a person walking around with their hands in their pockets and a cigarette in their mouth, it's supposed to be real, but what does it tell you about the human being? Diane's recent experience of performances at the Goetheanum was that, because there's so much contained in them, the actors often left spaces between dialogues to let the content sink in.

biodynamic beekeepers, scientists and philosophers. In the film, Gunther explains CCD and sheds light on Steiner's lectures. He says, "In 1923, Steiner was speaking to the workers at the Goetheanum and made a startling prediction: in 80 to 100 years bees would die out because of the mechanization and industrialization of beekeeping." Attending the lecture was a professional beekeeper, Mr. Muller, who rebelled when Steiner said that artificial methods of breeding queen bees will have a catastrophic long-term impact. Steiner predicted that a century later all breeding of bees will cease if only artificially produced bees are used. Muller challenged his statement vehemently. Steiner replied saying, "It is quite correct that we can't determine this today; it will have to be delayed until a later time. Let's talk to each other again in one hundred years, Mr. Muller, then we'll see what kind of opinion you'll have at that point."

Later in Queen of the Sun, Gunther Hauk solemnly examines his bees. It is eighty-five years since Steiner made his harrowing prediction and the kind of breeding Steiner lamented is not only the standard practice of commercial beekeeping, it is supplemented with artificial insemination. Gunther Hauk compares queen breeding to the breeding practices we have done with cows, pigs and chickens. "The bees are one of the animals that have been manipulated for more than 100 years." Sadly, Gunther explains, "Now, with the Colony Collapse Disorder, it's clear that Steiner's prediction has come true. As Steiner said, our very lives depend on beekeeping." Gunther continues, "We have to raise queens again the natural way. We have to focus on the health of other living things before our self, that's the only way that we are going to survive."

To exemplify Steiner's prediction, Queen of the Sun portrays the shocking reality of modern industrialized beekeeping. Michael Pollan, author of The Omnivore's Dilemma, explains that beekeepers from all across the country bring their bees on semi trucks to California every year to pollinate the almond crops. After traveling thousands of miles, the bees are extremely stressed when they arrive. Pollan explains, "It's become this giant Bee Bordello, where diseases are spread to other bees. The USDA even allowed bees to be imported from Australia, which carried viruses unfamiliar to American bees." The bees immune systems struggle against these diseases because of lack of nutrition. "To combat this, the hives are fed high-fructose corn syrup laced with antibiotics." Says Pollan, "And if there's anything more viscerally offensive, it's feeding the creators of honey, high fructose cornsyrup."

Queen of the Sun reveals that the massive die-offs of honeybees is a result of a multitude of complex problems such as malnutrition, pesticides, genetically modified

crops, migratory beekeeping, parasites, pathogens, lack of genetic diversity and queen over breeding. Beyond just looking at the causes, the film goes further to examine the bigger picture. Johannes Wirz, Biologist and Biodynamic beekeeper at the Goetheanum passionately explains, "If bees are dying, we can be sure that butterflies will be dying, solitary bees will be dying, bumble bees will be dying and we know from a point of conventional academic ecology that if insets are dying, birds will be dying, plants will be dying." Gunther Friedmann, a German Demeter Biodynamic beekeeper adds, "In Europe bees are completely dependent on human care and on human help. Without this care many, many bee colonies will die and only very few will survive."

Scientists all around the world are searching for the silver bullet cure to Colony Collapse Disorder and have failed to find a culprit. Queen of the Sun, instead, looks through Steiner's perspective to find the solutions. In the heartland of the United States, Queen of the Sun follows Gunther Hauk as he creates Spikenard Farm, one of the first honeybee sanctuaries in the world. Like David facing Goliath, Spikenard is surrounded by the agribusiness: neighboring Monsanto plants and endless miles of genetically modified corn. Decades of industry have done untold damage to the land, air and water. Committed to change, Hauk teaches biodynamic gardening and holistic beekeeping, so that future generations can return agriculture to its place as the foundation for a thriving society. Using biodynamic farming methods, he is planting diverse crops and thinking of the whole farm as a sentient organism made up of inter-dependent processes.

While solutions are simple, they are not easy. Ron Breland, a Biodynamic beekeeper, passionately explain what it will take to solve the bee crisis, "The writing is on the wall for industrial farming and potentially for commercial beekeepers. If bees die out that whole system will crumble." Ron and Michael Pollan give practical solutions to the problem of industrial farming and suggest that, instead of trucking bees into these vast monocultures, farmers must carve out large sections where bees and their beekeepers can live in a healthy environment on the farm year round.



Jacqueline Freeman, a Biodynamic beekeeper & farmer explains that too often beekeepers are thinking about what they can get from bees – It's about profit – but, she says, "I'm a unusual beekeeper, I'm in it for the love." In a culture where bees are feared, she is fighting to combat people's stigma around bees. Jacqueline addresses people's fears as she rescues a bee swarm from a suburban backyard. "When a swarm comes, most people get freaked out and call an exterminator." As she rescues the swarm she shows a new beekeeper how to take care of the bees. "There is something about the bees – they have this sense of sacrifice. I think about that in terms of community. How much more of their own personal comfort would each individual sacrifice in order to move us all forward?"

Near the beginning of the film, Gunther Hauk says, "Personally, I am grateful for a crisis. The crisis will give us the possibility to learn something, if we are willing; if the heart opens up enough to tell the mind something." Springing from this cue, Queen of the Sun shows people around the world who are creating a movement in support of bees, that strives again, to renew a culture in balance with nature. Using the metaphor of the bees, the film looks deeply at how such tiny insects can provide solutions, even in our human community. At The Center for Discovery, a biodynamic, community farm for autistic and handicapped individuals, Beekeeper Kerry Grefig helps mentally disabled individuals bottle honey. "The beehive is a great metaphor for a sustainable community. If you take a single bee out of a hive, it can't live on its own. It's dependent upon community. It won't survive 24 hours." While handicapped residents are assisted by physical therapists, Kerry says "And even though some humans can survive on their own, the individuals that we take care of here cannot. They really are dependent upon a team of people coming together to be of service to them just like the bees do." At the Melissa Gardens, Michael Thiele, a Biodynamic beekeeper adds to this, "The beehive is like a

monastery. There is a striving for selflessness. All of the bees dedicate their lives for the bigger entity, the beehive."

Rudolf Steiner often seemed difficult to translate to a mainstream audience for Queen of the Sun. For example, Rudolf Steiner said, "Whoever looks at a beehive could say: the entire cosmos can find its way into human beings and help make them sound in mind and body." To communicate such complex ideas, Taggart Siegel and Producer/Editor Jon Betz looked for real-life situations that embodied Steiner's ideas concerning the beehive. One such example was bringing the extraordinary Michael-Easter festival, The Bee Master, created in Australia by Horst and Jennifer Kornberger to the screen. The Bee Master brought together community on behalf of the honeybee. The six-day festival celebrated the intimate connection between the beehive and the transformation of human culture. The Kornberger's explain the beehive as a metaphor, and discuss the creation of a society that is a 'global hive', in which communities co-create a vessel of cultural renewal that is both spiritual and physical. Rudolf Steiner spoke about festivals that re-integrate the artistic, scientific and social spheres: "Festivals are used to bind human beings strongly together. Not merely to discuss external social reforms, but to do something that connects the earth with the heavens.

The challenge for Siegel and Betz was to relate this festival, which was heavily steeped in Steiner's philosophy, back to a larger audience. Ultimately Queen of the Sun focuses on exemplifying how the Bee Master Play, an integral part of the festival, portrays queen over breeding: the key problem Steiner predicted would cause bees to die out. In Queen of the Sun, we see how in The Bee Master play, the queen bee, a majestic crowned woman, is trapped in a cage, beautifully singing. Human companions listen to her song. Jennifer Kornberger, who wrote the play, explains how queens are put in cages, and shipped around the world in 747s. She explains, "In this metaphor of the queen in a cage, I was looking into how bees were being handled in the world today. And the queen represents the soul of the world." To contextualize the bigger picture *The Bee Master* play festival represents, Siegel and Betz also featured Horst Kornberger. He says, "We have to care for nature, and nature will care for us in turn. So community is not just a human problem, it is a global problem – community with the planet, with nature."

Queen of the Sun embodies Rudolf Steiner's writing and work largely through its characters, who are living examples of Steiner's views on the natural world. This, Siegel and Betz believe, brings Steiner's work into the film in a way that is constantly relevant to the bee crisis and the many modern challenges we are facing.

Queen of the Sun is seeking volunteers as we are launching our global outreach campaign. During this campaign we are actively linking up with grassroots organizations to promote principles of biodynamic beekeeping, sustainable agriculture and a renewal of community in balance with the natural world. 


