What Are We to Each Other?

Please join us for a conversation (with listening bowls) toward imagining the future of the Anthroposophical Society, and the role of a new General Secretary

On February 18 we would like to invite you to join us to ponder this question together: What are we to each other, as members of the Anthroposophical Society? Our conversation is intended to help inform the nominating process for a new general secretary of the Anthroposophical Society in America. An aspect of this can be: what it is that we hope for from the Society and from each other? Jannebeth Roell from Portland is one of five members of the nominating committee, and has agreed to be part of the conversation. We will engage one another by means of the Listening Bowl Process developed by Carrie Gibbons, which several of us have found to be a profound experience.

Upon receiving a packet from the Society which was sent to all members, and the news that Jannebeth was involved, Rebecca Soloway had an impulse, or imagination: What if members of branches had conversations that could help to inform this process, and the future of our struggling society! Can we consider together what we can contribute from our local activity and individual efforts?

On a rainy recent afternoon, over bowls of soup made from winter squash soup from Valerie's garden, three of us – Carrie, Neil and Valerie met to have a conversation about how the Portland Branch might respond to this call for nominations. What was immediately apparent was that we had no names to recommend to Jannebeth - but we did have a lot to say to each other about our thoughts for the future of the Anthroposophical Society, as well as how we in Portland might work together for that future.

three of *us* were most interested in the 'spiritual treasure' of the Christmas Foundation. Whatever one might say about that Christmas Foundation, *we* hear the Foundation Stone resounding in Portland in 2016.

[And here's what Rudolf Grosse has said: "The Christmas Foundation is the Beginning of a New Cosmic Age!" And F.W. Zeylmans Van Emmichoven: "When the Foundation Stone of the General Anthroposophical Society was laid, it was possible to experience the event as a Mystery, whose deep significance will only reveal itself to mankind as time goes on"]

Included in the mailed packet from the ASA were these words from Rudolf Steiner of January 30, 1924 in The Constitution of the School for Spiritual Science:

"We have not the right to give people anything else than what they themselves are longing for. It is important for us to gain this spirit. We have no right to place ourselves above the people to whom we have something to bring. We must wean ourselves of the habit of appearing in a doctrinal fashion or as agitators. We must be able to make it true, that insight—pure insight—is the fundamental element of the life of the Anthroposophical Society.

But the Anthroposophical Society must also be administered –that is to say, the spiritual treasure must be administered, and to this end human beings are needed. This too had to be provided by the Christmas Foundation Meeting."

Arising out of our relationships with one another in community, we call on members of the Portland Anthroposophical community to join us for an evening of listening, using the *Listening Bowls* and the practice of listening developed by Carrie. This process can lead each participant to consciously create a sacred space in which to receive what is spoken by the other. The theme of our meeting: What is our perception of the Anthroposophical Society? As members of the ASA, what/who are we to each other?

In the meantime, we can consider some clear thoughts offered by Marjorie Spock about the needed preparation for such a conversation:

"One cannot, however, step with a single stride from ordinary thought and chatter into a Goethean conversation. The latter requires the most loving preparation. Thoughts must first be conceived like children, and then brooded out in the spirits of the thinkers. To this end the theme of the meeting is set in advance. Each member lives with it as a developing concern in his meditation. As the day of the foregathering draws near, s(he) begins to anticipate the coming together of a festival of light which, if s(he) and her fellows have done their work well, will lead to their illumination by the spiritual world."



Pamela Whitman: Light, Color and Darkness

Don't miss Pamela Whitman's March visit to Portland! In addition to her presentation at the opening of her exhibit at the Art Hall on Friday, March 11, that weekend she will be offering a special opportunity to learn veil painting.

Pamela is a certified Light, Color and Darkness Painting Therapist; an international teacher of the work of Liane Collot d'Herbois, Rudolf Steiner and Goethe; and an adjunct faculty member of Rudolf Steiner College. She has always had multifaceted interests spanning art, science and spirit, and the relationship between them. She brings to her students and clients her love, enthusiasm, patience, understanding and dedication to this work.

Pamela has created art since childhood, often inspired by religious themes and calligraphy. From an early age she was also drawn to science, and worked actively to develop this interest. Her dream of attending MIT became a reality, and she was one of fifty women in her class of 950. She pursued her love of crystals and science through Materials Science but felt something was missing. Half way through, she changed her major to Humanities and Science, to be able to encompass more art, philosophy and psychology. In retrospect, she feels that what she was really looking for at that time was Goethean Science. Her B.S. thesis focused on the work of Teilhard de Chardin, integrating science, spirit and the evolution of consciousness, themes she took up in various ways until she found anthroposophy about 15 vears later.

With a foundation in both science and the humanities, she has worked across the spectrum, including teaching in a boys' reform school, making and marketing radiation detectors for medical and space applications, being a milieu therapist in a psychiatric hospital, doing environmental research and monitoring on Lake Tahoe and being an educational activist. She has traveled

widely, seeking the perspective of the rest of the world, including driving from Germany to Nepal and back again with a friend. She studied calligraphy and other arts over many years and did freelance calligraphy and graphic work. Teaching has woven through all of her adult life, and she helped to found and administrate a Waldorf School. Through Waldorf education she discovered anthroposophy, which eventually led her to her true vocation in the pioneering work in Light, Color and Darkness of Liane Collot d'Herbois, anthroposophical artist and therapist.

Pamela has done considerable study of art and anthroposophy at Rudolf Steiner College and has sought out and worked with many of the early practitioners of the work of Collot d'Herbois in this country and Europe. She has studied painting most

extensively with artist Leszek Forczek. She participated in the second international training in Light, Color and Darkness

Painting Therapy at the

Emerald Foundation in The Hague, completing her requirements as a Painting Therapist as part of her Masters degree program in Human Development. She feels fortunate to have met and worked with Collot d'Herbois during the last 5 years of her life. She received her certification as a Painting Therapist from the Medical Section at the Goetheanum in Dornach, Switzerland.

Her career and interests bridge the fields of science, art, spirituality, consciousness, psychology, healing and education, all of which she incorporates as a painting therapist and adult educator, and on occasion, as a lazure artist. She is grateful now for the impetus to devote more time to painting, research and writing. Her husband is an acupuncturist and healer; they have two children and two grandchildren and live in Grass Valley, CA.

Help for Honeybees & Beekeepers: Winter is a good time to prepare a beehive!

It is a nice winter project to assemble a beehive to be ready for setting out in April.

Warré Top Bar Beehives are meant for hands-off, minimalist and sustainable beekeeping practices and are suited to provide a comfortable home for honeybees in the Pacific Northwest. Used extensively by backyard beekeepers in the United States and Europe, they are designed to be simple, economical, bee-friendly and to assure a surplus of honey for the beekeeper.

A kit can save a lot of money. I have built these Demeter compliant Warré beehive kits for beekeepers in the Willamette Valley since 2008. My hives were chosen to be placed in the Spikenard Bio-dynamic Honey Bee Sanctuary in Virginia and Taggart Siegel, the director of the honey bee documentary "Queen of the Sun", chose my Warré beehives to place in his back yard at his home. 


