All Souls Day 2020

– More Important Than Ever!

Dear Friends,

As we observe All Souls Day 2020, in a year of profound disruptions, let us reflect on the essential nature of our responsibility to those across the Threshold; and on how we

and they may benefit from being in communication as we seek truth and direction.

Instead of the usual purposes and how-to's for staying connected with those who have crossed, I will focus at this critical time on the importance of staying connected with Rudolf Steiner himself. I will draw largely on Sergei Prokofieff's lecture in Dornach, for the 87th anniversary of Rudolf Steiner's death, *On the Anniversary of Rudolf Steiner's Death*, March 30, 2012.[1]

Prokofieff opens, poignantly, with a quote from Ita Wegman: "You see him as much too small."

Equally poignantly, he opens his afterward with more from a Wegman letter to a friend in 1942: "Why do you distance yourself so much from Rudolf Steiner?"

Prokofieff begins with the observation that we should never forget that the Society has nearly as many members in the spiritual world as here on Earth, who have "crossed the threshold to the spiritual world in unbreakable loyalty to this Society, to anthroposophy, and especially to Rudolf Steiner." (We can remember here three dear friends from our own Portland community, loyal to Rudolf Steiner, who have crossed recently – Beth Weiting, Betty Baldwin, and Dr. Robert Kellum.)

Prokofieff then addresses what can come up for people as they occupy themselves with Rudolf Steiner's work, and try to approach him spiritually. Reflecting on the serious problem of anthroposophists who spend time seeking alleged mistakes, or "entering into endless discussions as to whether something racist can be found in Rudolf Steiner's formulations" (which is as far from the truth of Rudolf Steiner as one could get. vh) Prokofieff has found only one answer. As these people approach Rudolf Steiner, "...(such people) simply cannot stand his greatness."

Through Anthroposophical training which leads the aspirant close to the threshold, the guardian "...shows to a person

in an unvarnished way that despite everything he has become accustomed to believe about his own importance, there is in reality very little and perhaps even less than little."

Prokofieff describes two directions that we could take at that juncture: having the courage to compare our deeds and achievements in life with those of Rudolf Steiner and withstanding the discrepancy, thereby coming closer to him; or failing to notice that the problem lies in ourselves, in wanting to degrade Rudolf Steiner to our own, much lower level. According to Prokofieff this often doesn't work its way into consciousness.

Prokofieff then addresses the discussion among some members of whether or not one should revere Rudolf Steiner. He notes that 'should'

is not appropriate in this consciousness soul period. And that admiration of a person is no longer appropriate for the mature human being. The small child's naive reverence, which is to be cultivated and developed, transforms in the mature person into a path of inner development and reverence for truth and knowledge. Rudolf Steiner, Prokofieff tells us, "...is the bearer of the Spirit of Truth for our time, of which Christ spoke in his farewell address in the Gospel of John, saying that this Spirit of Truth would come over humanity", as it did on Whitsun

morning. "...for our time of the consciousness soul and for the Michael-epoch in which we live, Rudolf Steiner is the bearer, the messenger of the Spirit of Truth." In him "truth and person flowed together into a unity."

Here Prokofieff's endnote is instructive for further developing our understanding of Rudolf Steiner, and thereby forging a connection with him. . " ... In this connection, the following remembrances of Countess Johanna von Keyserlingk from the time with Rudolf Steiner in Dresden in September 1919 are of significance: 'From these Dresden days the following has remained significant in my memory: As one can imagine, we were often occupied with the question: "Who is this mysterious Rudolf Steiner?" Because Mrs. Von Moltke now knew that I have clairvovance, and Rudolf Steiner also communicated this to Marie Steiner and Miss Waller, she could not help considering my opinion about it. I said to her: 'Rudolf Steiner's external figure seems to me like a sheath behind which a gleaming gold spirit-form emerges." Then I said: "He bears the force which Christ promised He would send as the 'comforter', who leads us in complete truth." Mrs. Von Moltke didn't reject these thoughts, but replied that she couldn't accept them, because Rudolf Steiner firmly refuses attributing "divinity" to her person by his pupils, he would definitely oppose them. So I asked her to somehow pose this question to Rudolf Steiner. She went to him and raised the question. I waited for her in the hotel and saw how she sank into the chair and said: "Yes, he confirmed what you said."

In yet another end note Prokofieff offers written notes for a lecture by Ita Wegman in which she describes two main conditions necessary for an inner connection with Rudolf Steiner. "The first condition is the 'understanding for the ideas of the Christmas Conference'. For only the understanding of this central deed of Rudolf Steiner's could – so she writes – hold him still for a longer period of time on Earth. 'As that does not appear to be the case, he has left us.' But even after his death this question of understanding remains relevant. Ita Wegman writes: 'In many people there lives the burning question: "Is Rudolf Steiner still connected with us after his death?" Her answer is: 'When we didn't understand him during his life is it possible to understand him now?' When this understanding is forthcoming, then Rudolf Steiner can remain connected even today with the people 'who stand by him'. This can happen only by additionally fulfilling the second condition: 'When such feelings that express devotion and pure love rise up to him, a renewed connection with him occurs out of freedom; then he will remain with us and continue to be our teacher beyond life and death'. Thus, this connection with Rudolf Steiner is possible at all times for members of the Anthroposophical Society, when selflessly and in freedom, they fulfill these two conditions.

It seems that Rudolf Steiner made us a promise, with Benedictus's speech in the third Mystery Drama, *The Guardian* of the Threshold (6th Act):

I must accompany everyone who receives The spirit light from me in Earth-being, Whether he devoted himself knowingly Or only unconsciously to me as spiritual pupil, And must accompany him further on the path That he treaded through me in spirit.

Let's take him up on this promise!

I suggest, that if it is at all possible for you to do so, you find someone(s) that you can come together with in person (wherever two or more are gathered) on All Souls Day, November 2, to light candles, read together a lecture from Rudolf Steiner related to life between death and rebirth, and seek to connect with him and those who have crossed the threshold – those who you have a connection with. Let us together shine a light to the spiritual world.

The Anthroposophical Movement and the Concept of Race in Context

An Excerpt from a Lecture by Rudolf Steiner

Editor's Note: The following excerpt is from a lecture given by Rudolf Steiner to audiences attending the Fifth Congress of the Federation of European Sections of the Theosophical Society, held in Budapest between May 30 and June 12, 1909 (GA 109). Those present at the lectures were therefore somewhat familiar with the background of his anthroposophical teachings. He constantly emphasized the distinction between his written works and reports of lectures that were given as oral communications and were not originally intended for print. At the time when the following lectures were given, Rudolf Steiner was still General Secretary of the German Section of the Theosophical Society and was using the terms "theosophy" and "theosophical," although always in the sense of the anthroposophical spiritual science presented by him from the beginning. In accordance with a suggestion he made later on, these designations have in many cases been replaced by "anthroposophy," "spiritual science," "anthroposophical" or "spiritual scientific."

hat, then, is the anthroposophical movement? It came into the world because the lofty beings we call the Masters, who live in human physical bodies but have reached the far higher stage of evolution than the average man of today, poured out a certain amount of wisdom from the last third of the nineteenth century onwards. The living influx of this wisdom from higher realms into our culture is the actual basis of our anthroposophical movement. Do not imagine that there was no possibility of the attempted influx of wisdom falling upon deaf ears in humanity. Even if there had been deaf ears, the Masters would have said that an attempt must be made later on, when human beings would be ready to receive the wisdom. In occultism this is known as the test of maturity in men. The fact that wisdom pours into humanity from higher beings such as these is not in itself sufficient; what matters is how it is received; the success of the test depends upon that. Such tests have already been made several times but have not always succeeded. It was often within narrow limits that humanity proved to be ripe for the tests; receptive souls and hearts were not always to be found. When the ego of humanity was to be instilled, the test consisted in gradual attempts to perorate what had formerly been astral body only, with the ego. Then it turned out that the astral body, permeated by the ego, was incapable of penetrating the physical body. Adjustment was therefore necessary and this was made possible by the separation of the moon. It was in the middle of the Lemurian epoch that the entry of the ego, the Christ principle, was first achieved.

But the following was connected with this. During and after

the separation of the moon, the earth was depopulated. We have heard that the bodies had become so contaminated that they could no longer provide habitations for the souls. Cosmic happenings such as these have been preserved in legend and saga, but occult investigation reveals their true origin and teaches us that while the separation of the moon was taking place, when the earth was depopulated, many souls were searching for suitable embodiment in cosmic space; they departed from the earth and assumed bodies on other planets. But when the moon had finally left, it became apparent that the earth was capable again of providing suitable bodies. Now, the souls, who during the latest Lemurian epoch and thereafter in the Atlantean period had gone to the planets, presented them-selves again on the earth and incarnated in the bodies there. Groups of human beings now formed on the earth. Some provided bodies for souls coming from Jupiter incarnations, or from Mars, Venus or Saturn. These souls now found bodies that were appropriate for them. This grouping of souls gave rise to the birth of races. Hence there is a certain connection between the races and cosmic bodies and thus it was possible to speak of Saturn men, Jupiter men and so on. What can be called the concept of race had now, for the first time, its justification.

On Old Moon, and also on the earth while it was still united with the moon, there were human beings at different stages of evolution. This can be perceived right on into the Lemurian epoch, when owing to the exodus of the moon, differentiation took place in humanity. Thereafter the concept of race arose and from then on began to have a certain meaning, a certain significance. Race is something that comes into being and subsequently passes away again. The epoch of the formation of the races is that embraced by Lemuria and Atlantis. Today only stragglers of the races are present.

Here we are on earth together, seeking our own vulnerability and open-heartedness in order that we may "entertain" and connect to the earth and to all the people on it.



Our goal was to finish with the first year curriculum this December, but with the ever changing times we are staying flexible and may add another term to truly master the basic elements laid out in the first year curriculum. We are supported by wonderful subject teachers who help provide a bigger picture of anthroposophy and art to the Eurythmy curriculum. We are grateful to the larger community for all of the support that they show us.

n this second to last month of the year, the third day of which stands out in many minds as a type of pivot point, where do we place our attention? For many of us, Election day is starkly present in our awareness. Might we give our vote of confidence to the benevolent spiritual world? And how?

So much of a farmer and gardener's time and focus is taken up with what is right in front of their eyes: the squash are ripe and need to be harvested, the aphids are feasting on the kale, the birdbath is empty again.

As we come into November we may ask: How might we actually awaken spiritually? This aspect of life can often escape us, as we are hustling and bustling just to get the physical details of gardening handled. Covering up the water spigots, rolling up hoses, maybe even managing to cut back all the brown rangey old flower stalks, and raking leaves, all sorts of tasks beckon.

We could begin with the theme of paying attention. And like a creative gardener, who wants to sow every inch of her city yard, we could add to this the activity of thanksgiving. We can start by making it a point to appreciate the everyday graces and beauty. The bright red sunset, peeking out from under the gray bank of clouds, is glorious. Goldfinches in the hemlock, hummingbirds on the last red flowers for a split second, the moist morning air, all more than amazing. And then to continue: ask: what have I taken for granted? Clouds, stars and clear air. What have I not shown appreciation for? Mushrooms, bugs that come into the warm house, oodles of spiderwebs. And always ending with: what have I forgotten? The soft fur of my dog, zillions of little pea gravel stones and the stalwart swiss chard.


