# ANTHROPOSOPHICAL CONFERENCE 8-11-05



Thoughts from the Being Awake conference by Diane Rowley. Diane is full-time College Chairperson for the Portland Waldorf School where she works in servant leadership with the faculty, administration, and board. She was introduced to Anthroposophy through Waldorf education in 1985 when she enrolled her oldest daughter in the kindergarten after moving to Portland from Montana.

As I look back on the conference, there are several things that stand out for me. The opening lecture, given by Virginia Sease, laid the groundwork for a strong thread that ran throughout the whole conference. This was the need to be awake to the development of the new capacity for heart thinking, or thinking with the heart. A prerequisite to this is to develop logical, consequential thinking, which leads to a logical conscience. A strong conscience is the bridge from the logical head thinking to heart thinking, and also helps bring discernment, and is a safeguard against misperceptions. Then Marijo Rogers picked up the theme of Being Awake by reminding us of a quote from Thoreau: "Only that day dawns to which we are awake" and then one from Rudolf Steiner: "The age of Michael has dawned. Hearts are beginning to have thoughts." Thoreau invites us to be awake to each day and Steiner calls us to wake up and be conscious to an entire age, through heart thinking. One of the challenges to heart thinking is the need for soul development in a time when the soul of the human being is often under siege. But Michael is the protector of the human soul and stands ready to help us.

Marijo went on to talk about the role of technology and shared the possibility that technology is not a product but a cosmic force that no one can stop. We need to be cognizant of what it wants:

- 1) to be ubiquitous present everywhere in daily life
- 2) to be invisible
- 3) what it really wants is human attention..... but if we are awake, ultimately it can lead to freedom.

Each day, the speakers deepened and broadened the wakefulness we are being called upon to have in relationship to self, others, the world and the spiritual world. There were several references of how to utilize the rhythm of sleeping and waking, for working with the spiritual world, which can be enhanced by working with the Foundation Stone Meditation. Before sleeping - we can practice Spirit Recollection, reviewing our day. During the day - practice Spirit Mindfulness (a suggestion was given to rename it Spirit Heartfulness, as we are striving toward heart thinking), and in

the morning upon waking – practice Spirit Vision, recalling what we learned in the night.

On Saturday, Cornelius Pietzner ended his presentation with the reminder that "An unusual alchemy takes place when we bring the force of our will into thinking....this is the pathway to Freedom. When we bring our thinking, in loving devotion into our actions, we develop Love. Freedom and Love are the sculptors of the thinking heart, not only able to perceive, but also able to respond."

The highlight of the conference for me, was an unexpected moment at the very end. During the plenum, two young people from the Youth Section spoke of their commitment to the work of changing the world through Anthroposophy. During previous days, I had been in a discussion group on Community Building, with them and had been impressed with their enthusiasm and freshness. But I was deeply moved by a poem performed by Jeremiah Turner, a Waldorf School graduate, after he had spoken about what was living among the youth in these times: concern about globalization, social competency, environment, etc. He said that there was a strong connection to poetry, the power of the word. And then he shared his poem, which had elements of music, rap, meditation and anthroposophical insight. But what moved me the most about the youth, was their strong sense of hope and the apparent courage to meet what is living today with action, yet a deep respect for and desire to learn from what was living in the older people at the conference.

Throughout the conference, I was amazed by the warmth and interest of fellow participants. Rarely did I sit next to a stranger, without receiving an introduction and finding a strong connection to who they were as a human being. Awakening to the other seemed very alive and genuine, and I know the awakening has just begun.

# AWAKEN TO THE MICHAEL AGE



This article was summarized by James Lee from a talk given by Virginia Sease at the Being Awake conference in Ann Arbor, Michigan this past August. Virginia is a member of the Executive Council of the Anthroposophical Society in Dornach, Switzerland, where she is also Director and Coordinator of Anthroposophical Studies.

We may consider ourselves to be in the core of Michael's time as the ruling Archangel on earth. Michael's reign began in 1879. Gabriel was the ruling Archangel until 1879, promoting the influence of culture, family, and heredity. The influence of a departing Archangel lasts approximately one-hundred years as an echo; the influences of the Gabriel Age

could be felt until about 1979. The Archangel Oriphiel will follow Michael in 2300 or 2400. The core of the pure Michael Age can be expected to last until about 2200, and then Oriphiel's influence will begin to be felt by humanity in advance of his time in power. Our current human incarnation in the Michael Age will most likely be our last. Rudolf Steiner tells us that the constraints of technology will be so difficult that anthroposophists will choose to return at the beginning of the Oriphiel Age to help human beings overcome immense hardening forces, and to awaken them to their spiritual nature. We must make progress now to prepare for the Oriphiel Age.

In relation to thinking with the heart – the new capability of heart thinking – Rudolf Steiner wrote in the Society Newsletter about the threefold task of Michael. This task includes the freeing of thoughts from the region of the head and senses (body free thinking), opening a free pathway for these thoughts to be influenced by the heart, and freeing

enthusiasm so the human being may have a direct and conscious experience with these thoughts.

Michael wants to live in the souls and hearts of human beings in which thoughts are so formed. We need to develop a logical thought process to safeguard from succumbing to sensationalism and fantasies of an occult nature. Rudolf Steiner wrote that logical thinking in the head leads to logical conscience in the heart. We must develop this bridge between the head and heart through a three step process that will lead to conscience.

- 1. Become a thought detective: **Understand**.
- 2. Understand the thought through logic: Comprehend.
- 3. Know it deeply with the heart: **Experience**.

We need to do something with heart thinking through sacrifice to the spiritual world. This sacrifice can be made by not trying to harvest as many thoughts as possible, but instead by working through our thoughts with our hearts and offering the resulting substance back to the Hierarchies. Through this we are making a connection of the thought with the word. Thought permeates the word and thereby touches our etheric nature in the supersensible realm. We will thereby develop the capacity to comprehend from etheric body to etheric body. Rudolf Steiner gave a verse on this idea which is called the America Verse.

May our feeling penetrate
Into the center of our heart,
And seek, in love, to unite itself
With the human beings seeking the same goal;
With the spirit beings, who, bearing grace,
Strengthening us from realms of light
And illuminating our love,
Are gazing down upon
Our earnest, heartfelt striving.

# THE CHALLENGES OF THINKING WITH THE HEART

This article contains the basis of MariJo's talk at the Being Awake Conference in August.

The following is a talk given by MariJo Rogers at the Being Awake Summer Conference of the Anthroposophical Society 8/11/05.

It is a privilege to speak with you in beautiful Ann Arbor. There are nearly 700 of us in Rackham Auditorium tonight, and it's worth recalling that there are many others who are with us in spirit. It might be worthwhile to take a moment to recall two or three people whom you know would like to have attended as well. May our heart's warmth and light imbue us all as we spend these coming days together.

The theme of our conference this weekend is: "Being Awake: How do I awaken to the Spirit in myself and to the Spirit in the world?" One well-known American writer who understood the importance of being awake was Henry David Thoreau, nineteenth century naturalist and philosopher (1817-1862) who wrote in his book *Walden*, published in 1854, "Only that day dawns to which we are awake."

Seventy years later, in 1924, Rudolf Steiner writes, "The Age of Michael has dawned. Hearts are beginning to have thoughts." (*Leading Thoughts*, p. 53)

We are inspired by Thoreau to be awake to each day. That is challenge enough. And now we are inspired by Rudolf Steiner to wake up and be conscious to an entire age.

"Hearts are beginning to have thoughts." Our hearts are being called to wake up! To become conscious. And at this time, that means to start thinking.

In this context of the theme of waking up to what is dawning in ourselves and in the world, we're speaking tonight on the challenges of thinking with the heart. This phrase was used as a technical term by Rudolf Steiner, particularly in his lectures in *Macrocosm & Microcosm* given in Vienna in 1910. I'd like to turn first to the world about us and consider what our souls meet on a daily basis.

Think over to the country of Afghanistan then back to March 2001. At that time the press began to report that Taliban militia were demolishing statues across the country to prevent the worship of what they considered to be false idols. What seemed particularly to draw world-wide shock and extensive media coverage was Mullah Omar's decree to destroy the 2,000-year-old Bamiyan buddhas, statues that were considered by some to be part of our world cultural heritage, one of them the world's tallest Buddha statue, 165 feet high, carved into the side of a mountain.

With the media's coverage of that destruction came other stories of Taliban activities in Afghanistan, including a pervasive oppression, even brutality, against women. During this time, I heard a brief radio interview on National Public Radio with two Afghani women – a very rare thing, a very dangerous thing for those women to do – and what one of them said from behind her burqa was so striking that I jotted it down on a nearby envelope. As she spoke, a translator said these words: "We are alive, but our souls are captured. They have been taken from us."

This is one of the challenges to heart thinking, for heart thinking cannot develop without soul development. Their souls, our souls, souls everywhere, are under siege. The World Soul herself is under siege. The Being of Sophia is under attack.

Now, I would like to share with you a few thoughts from a talk I attended several weeks ago in California. The speaker, Kevin Kelly (b. 1952), is in his mid-fifties, very warm and

calm, balding with a trimmed beard, a photojournalist, publisher of the *Whole Earth Review*, a number of *Whole Earth* catalogs, and founder of *Wired* magazine. He says he doesn't care much for high tech products, isn't a gadget collector, and he and his wife raised their children without television. However, he has long been interested in how technology is changing human beings, and how it affects our thinking and our feeling about things.

The talk I attended he titled, "What Technology Wants." "My quest," he says, "is to hear what technology wants to say to us."

Technology, he explained, should not be seen as a computer or a cell phone or an iPod. It works through these products, but in actuality, "Technology is a cosmic force," he said, adding that it is a force that he believes cannot be stopped. Among the many goals toward which this force seems to be driving are these two. The first is invisibility. From the giant ENIAC computer that took up an entire room to today's light laptop carried across this campus by many students, Kelly notes increasing miniaturization. Chips developed into microchips and today in labs around the world there are biochips. A second desire of technology is ubiquity. Note the proliferation of cell phones, and you might know that there are chips in our car engines, in our phones, in driver's licenses, on cases of shampoo, even implanted in 10,000 pets in the United States. One might say that technology has intentions.

Kelly then pointed out that overall one sees that technology creates differences, which open possibilities, which bring opportunities. In the end we have innumerable choices. Ultimately, technology can lead to freedom, he said.

One last remark from that talk that I'd like to share: Kelly says that technology generally tends to drive down the cost of things – the ENIAC, affordable only by a government, becomes the computer affordable by many families. Not only low cost, but no cost. As an example, some of us were given our cell phones for free if we bought the right calling plan. One day, Kelly postulates, the cost of all technology may be free, as items that can be copied can be made more and more cheaply and eventually given away.

When things are free, what price will we have to pay for that?" he asks, because everything comes with a price. "The only factor becoming scarce in a world of abundance is human attention," he answers. Human attention will be the currency of the future.

What does technology want? Our human attention.

So as we sail our soul through life, as we navigate our ship through rough waters and dark seas, we can ask ourselves the question, "Where *will* I place the light of my attention?"

#### Central to the task

Having considered a few challenges, we can turn to thinking of the heart. Let me begin with an image central to this waking up, this development of consciousness, called heart thinking.

Two thousand years ago, at the Mystery of Golgotha, after Christ died on the cross, Joseph of Arimathea, a member of the Jewish Sanhedrin, the ruling council, and a disciple of Christ, asked Pilate for the body. When he and Nicodemus took the body down from the cross, legend tells us that before wrapping the body in fine linen and laying it his own tomb, Joseph caught the blood that flowed from its wounds. We could imagine that to catch it he used a sacred vessel. Through the wisdom of the ages, the heart has been called an ancient, sacred vessel.

We could thus imagine that Joseph caught in his sacred cup the Ego forces of the Christ that were in that blood. Our task in this Age of Michael is to wake up to the existence of these forces brought by the Christ and to use them as they were meant to be used – for the ascent of humanity. They are forces of resurrection, and we are called to catch them in our hearts and use them at this time for the resurrection of thinking – which means developing the ability of thinking with the heart.

# What is heart thinking?

Heart thinking is a seeing into the spiritual world that is precise, warm and moral.

As explained by Rudolf Steiner, it is a thinking that has been conscientiously trained in logic. It has turned from the material world as its object of interest to the spiritual world and has developed in such a way that it becomes a seeing into the spiritual world. And because it has undergone the right preparatory training, this seeing immediately knows whether what it sees is true or false.

It is a type of thinking that is very different from ordinary thinking. In ordinary thinking our mind moves from one concept to another, deliberates, and after reflection, obtains knowledge. In heart thinking, reflection isn't used because we have a direct, moral experience that we understand immediately and can articulate to others by bringing it back into logical thinking.

This compellingly beautiful phrase, "thinking of the heart," as Rudolf Steiner uses it, is not referring to a kind or sympathetic way of thinking as might first come to mind. It is, rather, an exacting process that takes work to unfold.

"We earn the right to think with the heart," according to Rudolf Steiner.

# **Preparing for heart thinking**

If we want to develop heart thinking, some key ways to prepare include the following.

1. It is essential to develop logical thinking. It is not possible to do the heart thinking of the future without it, for this reason: Logical thinking, if well-developed, creates a kind of conscience in us that gives us a sense of responsibility toward truth. The conscience born of logical thinking becomes the ability to immediately discriminate between true and false as we see into the spiritual world. (See *Macrocosm and Microcosm*, lecture 9.)

In *Occult Science:* An *Outline* Rudolf Steiner elucidates that in order rightly to develop this new organ in the neighborhood of the heart, we must today learn to approach it through the head; otherwise, although we may have visions of the spiritual world, we will be unprepared to comprehend rightly in the moment what we are seeing. "To do heart thinking, preparatory training in logical thinking is essential, otherwise our feelings would quite certainly lead us into error," he explains.

- 2. Another helpful preparation for heart thinking is to train ourselves so that lies cause us to feel pain in our soul and truth causes us to feel joy. Or as he says in his lectures to the workers (*Learning to See into the Spiritual World*), "Truth and the striving for truth, must taste good to you; and lies, once you are conscious of them, must taste bitter and poisonous." For we cannot take both truth and lies into our soul in the same way in our daily consciousness and see truly in the spiritual world.
- 3. We can re-read *The Philosophy of Spiritual Activity*. Steiner called this book "gymnastics for the soul and spirit" (*Esoteric Development*, p. 141) and went on to say that while the contents are, of course, important, even more importantly "a reader must become accustomed to using his etheric body if he would think the thoughts in this book at all. Hence, this book is a means of education a very important means and must be taken up as such" (*Learning to See into the Spiritual World*, p. 10-11).

Loosening the etheric is necessary because in our time the etheric body is too deeply driven into the physical. The etheric heart also has the capacity to loosen from the physical heart. It must do so, to be able to carry the living thoughts of the spiritual world.

4. We can work with the Foundation Stone meditation. In it are resurrection forces that enable us to practice spirit-beholding. Practicing spirit-beholding is developing heart thinking. "And you will truly think."

# Heart thinking awakens in the Age of Michael

"The Age of Michael has dawned. Hearts are beginning to have thoughts." Rudolf Steiner continues further on, "Thoughts which at the present time strive to grasp the spiritual must originate in hearts that beat for Michael as the fiery Prince of Thought in the Universe" (*Leading Thoughts*, p. 53).

In a world where souls are imprisoned and human attention is stolen, we are called to open our hearts to a relationship with the being of Michael, countenance of Christ and protector of the World Soul. It is possible for us to turn our attention toward the spiritual and develop heart thinking at all because Michael is ready to help us. If we choose to work toward this conscious experience of the spiritual called heart thinking, Michael will come to meet us, to help us. "For it is his intention that thinking shall flow in future through the hearts of human beings" (*Leading Thoughts*, p. 97).

Why does he have this intention? Michael serves the Christ Light. His whole being is an activity of attention to the Christ. For the past 2,000 years, the resurrection forces caught by Joseph of Arimathea have been spreading from heart to heart, but like an underground river, this movement has been hard to trace. Today, this Christ Impulse wants to be consciously known. It wants to be seen where it dwells – in human hearts.

We can say that the day dawns because we begin to see the sun's light and then eventually to feel its warmth on our face. The sun of the dawning Michael Age will not be seen in the sky. It is an inner sun. It dwells in our hearts. This is where Michael has turned his attention. This is where we are called to turn our attention. It is where we may find the Grail of our heart filled with the forces of the Christed ego.

To think with the heart is to be a conscious carrier of the Grail. This is being awake as a truly human being.

# **BEING AWAKE CONFERENCE REFLECTIONS**

She has chosen a special moment to pass into the spiritual world, when this constellation of anthroposophists is gathered in North America to speak and sing to the stars.

Bodo von Plato (Plah-toe not Play-toe) inspires me with his alert questioning. What do we choose to notice? To remember? What do we fill our consciousness with? How do we know the concepts we keep as ours are true? From our conversation group on being human: there is the constant question in the dialogue between developing ourselves and what the world needs. We, individually, feel inadequate. That awakens us to others, and to the spiritual beings.

How refreshing to be able to turn to anyone sitting next to you and start speaking about the spiritual world. I left with more questions, beginnings of conversations and karmic meetings, joy, responsibility. Tired, but awake.

The virtue of the month that Rudolf Steiner gives for Sept 21 - Oct 21 when the sun is in the sign of Libra, the scales, is: "Contentment becomes Equanimity."

The sound for the air sign of Libra is CH as in loch--one can picture a light breeze wafting over a lake towards one, or TS as in its--we bend down to lift a heavy object and discover it is light as a feather.

Libra is the sense of taste. It is Realism. With our taste we can sense if something is too sweet, too salty, too sour, too bland; with our aesthetic sense we can tell if something has gone overboard in one direction or another, if it lacks reality. And by reality we must consider the spirit in matter. Consider a sculpture by an ancient Greek, and compare it with a modern one, let's say of a socialist worker. One breathes life, the other sits too heavy, seems dead, devoid of spirit. Content comes from the Latin meaning: to hold in, to contain. If our life has content, if it contains the spirit, we are content. When we are discontented we seek our reality elsewhere, through escapism into Lucifer's realm, or through gathering not the breath of spirit but through amassing "real" things, material things that we must have to feel and show that we are someone, that we have arrived. But once we have arrived, we wish for more, for something different. We attain composure, equanimity, when we realize that the spirit is in us, all around us, has created us, has created matter, is wafting through us every moment of our lives, that we live in the present between our wishes for the future and our attainments or experiences of the past. The spiritual world is working hard night and day in life and death to make sure we experience what we need to for our proper evolution. It is our task to be aware that though to normal thinking we should like to be elsewhere, that our destiny may seem heavy and dark, it is woven out of light. Michael waits for us to recognize where and how we stand between Sophia (Virgo) and the dragon (Scorpio). Libras have difficulty making decisions. They want to choose, to decide for the best,

go for what is right. They'll go along with the crowd just not to make waves, hoping for harmony. Can't we all just get along? We could do this, we could do that. They constantly weigh something in the scales: the weighing of the supposition of thoughts, the threshold from inner man to outer man. We step past the equinox and darkness seems to overcome the light more and more each day until the winter solstice. Michael holds the scales between the Virgin and the Dragon.

Contentment becomes equanimity, composure. Composition-how are things positioned, related to one another? Libra is ruled by Venus and there are many singer/composers who are Libras: John Lennon, Ray Charles, Paul Simon, Guiseppe Verdi to name a few.

This conference addresses questions that concern all of us. The questions include: How do we know what is real and what is illusion? How do we know what is fruitful and what is harmful? How do we know what is true and what is a lie? These are questions we experience every day of our lives in regard to the world around us and in regard to our own inner life and activity.

Taking as our starting point the work of Rudolf Steiner we will bring practical suggestions and positive images for us to work with in our own lives. One of the first exercises Rudolf Steiner gave in his book *How to Know Higher Worlds* was, "Learn to distinguish between the essential and the non-essential." This exercise is the foundation for our capacity to discriminate.

**Dennis Klocek** *Transforming Fantasy into Imagination* will explore the pitfalls of visionary consciousness and show how we can find balance with meditative and practical exercises. (Friday evening and Saturday morning)

<u>MariJo Rogers</u> *Parzival's Path is Our Path in the New Mysteries* explores the story of Parzival and his role as a forerunner of the inner struggles of our time. She will bring images from this story as models for dealing with failure by faithfulness to the spiritual needs of the times. (Saturday afternoon)

<u>Joan Almon</u> Helping the Child Discriminate Between What is True and What is Not takes our questions directly to the problems of childhood with this workshop and talk for parents and teachers. (Saturday morning)

<u>Joan Treadaway</u> What Do the New Mysteries Mean for the Education of the Child? is another workshop and talk addressing problems of childhood. (Saturday afternoon)

Saturday participants can choose between workshops on childhood and conversation groups on the subject of discernment, both personal and social. Participants may bring other topics for the conversation groups.

We will have the opportunity to experience Werbeck singing with <u>Diane Rowley</u> on Saturday. Late Saturday afternoon, a group of local members directed by <u>Diane Rumage</u> will enact for us Scene 10 from Rudolf Steiner's mystery drama *The Portal of Initiation*, which portrays Johannes struggling with spiritual discernment. A special highlight of the weekend will be an original piece, *Poetry in Buchenwald*, which is adapted from the work of Jacques Lusseyran and performed Saturday night by a group organized by <u>Natasha Moss.</u> <u>Jeffrey Levy</u> will tell the story, which includes music, eurythmy, marionettes and poetry. There will also be individual works by other eurythmists from the Northwest.

The conference will be followed on Sunday, October 23, 2005, by the **Annual General Meeting of the Anthroposophical Society in America** for members. It will run from 9:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The agenda for that meeting is being mailed to members. There is no fee to attend.
